# Millie Keddie's year with Project Trust update

First of all I would like to say a massive thank you to everyone who has supported my year volunteering with Project Trust, either by donating on my Just Giving page, helping with events and attending events. I am so lucky to live in a place like Auchenblae with such a supportive community.

I have almost reached my final target of £6,200. I would not have managed to do this without the support of so many people in the village! I have raised the money by writing to

charitable trusts, donations from extremely generous people, selling handmade soap at Christmas, a coffee morning, an art exhibition thanks to Brenda Forbes (Denmill Picture Framing) and more recently a fashion show hosted by Encore (Carrie Murdoch).

Many things have changed since my last article in the Messenger. I am now going to be teaching English and Maths in an orphanage in Cambodia. With Project Trust, you attend a selection course where you choose the top three countries where you want to be placed. Project Trust then look at the skills you have to offer and then decide on a project where you are best suited. Cambodia has always been my first choice but Project Trust did not allocate volunteers to this project until about a month ago. I will be heading off for a year in the third week in August.

I will be working in Honour Village, a little orphanage situated in a rural village, 30 minutes away from the famous temples of Angkor Wat. Honour Village is a school and place of safety set up in 2010. There are currently 13 children living at the centre as most of the residents have been re-housed and reintegrated into communities. The school serves both the children living there and those in the surrounding villages. 100's of children come to the school to learn English and basic Maths and computing every day.

I have training on the isle of Coll in the last week of July, where I will learn how to teach English as a foreign language as well as general teaching techniques. In this week I will also meet the 3 other volunteers I will be living and working with for the next year.

Thank you so much again, for all your kind support. It is very much appreciated, I will try to keep you updated on how things progress.

#### **Disturbing Happening in the Den**

A few weeks ago The Messenger Editor received this e-mail and found it very disturbing.

"My wife was walking our dog in the Den on Tuesday 21st March, early evening, when it was attacked by a vicious dog which was off the lead. Our dog, which was leashed, was left bleeding, lame and stressed. The owner of the attacker showing no remorse whatsoever, in fact blaming our dog for being aggressive.

Our dog is nearly 15 years old, has arthritis and cushings. In addition, my wife, whilst trying to protect our dog, ended up on the ground, bleeding from both knees with her clothes ruined.

Apart from the obvious injuries and anxiety caused by this out of control animal, more concerning was the lack of concern, responsibility and total denial of the owner. His immediate response was - Quote "he had a total right to walk his dog unleashed as it was a public park." More concerning was that the attack took place near a children's play area.

This is an experience we have never encountered before and is very concerning

Owners with dogs with a tendency to attack have a LEGAL responsibility to ensure that their dogs are leashed or muzzled if appropriate.

The Den is a credit to the village and an ideal area for walking dogs and for children playing and hopefully will be kept that way for everyone."

#### Dogs and the Law

When I read the e-mail about the attack in the Den I found it very disturbing. I have had a further communication from them. The wife's knees were so badly injured that she needed treatment at ARI. She was only able to get around with very great difficulty for some time. I decided to see what I could discover about the law and dogs on-line. There are pages and pages on the gov.uk site. The following is a brief summary.

**Overview.** It's against the law to let a dog be dangerously out of control anywhere, such as;

in a public place.

in a private place, e.g. a neighbour's house or garden in the owner's home.

The law applies to all dogs.

#### Out of Control.

Your dog is considered dangerously out of control if it:

injures someone.

makes someone worried that it might injure them.

A court could decide that your dog is dangerously out of control if either of the following apply:

it attacks someone's animal or the owner of an animal thinks they could be injured if they tried to stop your dog attacking their animal.

A farmer is allowed to kill your dog if it's worrying their livestock.

There are some lovely dogs in Auchenblae and virtually all owners are responsible. It is a pity that very occasionally something like this should happen.

Tea is often thought of as being a quintessentially British drink, and we have been drinking it for over 350 years. But in fact the history of tea goes much further back.

The story of tea begins in China. According to legend, in 2737 BC, the Chinese emperor Shen



Nung was sitting beneath a tree while his servant boiled drinking water, when some leaves from the tree blew into the water. Shen Nung, a renowned herbalist, decided to try the infusion that his servant had accidentally created. The tree was a Camellia sinensis, and the resulting drink was what we now call tea.

It is impossible to know whether there is any truth in this story. But tea drinking certainly became established in China many centuries before it had even been heard of in the west. Containers for tea have been found in tombs dating from

the Han dynasty (206 BC - 220 AD) but it was under the Tang dynasty (618-906 AD), that tea became firmly established as the national drink of China. It became such a favourite that during the late eighth century a writer called Lu Yu wrote the first book entirely about tea, the Ch'a Ching, or Tea Classic. It was shortly after this that tea was first introduced to Japan, by Japanese Buddhist monks who had travelled to China to study. Tea drinking has become a vital part of Japanese culture, as seen in the development of the Tea Ceremony, which may be rooted in the rituals described in the Ch'a Ching.






